Shandon's Finances

For the sake of transparency, I thought it would be valuable to the congregation to review Shandon's budget so that each of you would know our financial condition.

A review of our past calendar years would be an appropriate starting point. The last three calendar years have been a struggle for most individuals and businesses and, yet, it was no different for our church. Our total receipts for 2010 were \$2,092,550 and our expenses were \$2,087,769. Thus, Shandon finished the year with a small surplus of \$4,781. In comparison to the past three years – 2009, 2008, 2007, our surplus/(deficit) was (\$6,523), (\$26,356), \$11,205, respectively. Although our balance sheet at Shandon looks pretty favorable, we still owe the bank \$1,565,000 for our past and necessary renovations. The current budget does include some principal pay down. The church staff, our past Finance Chairman, Jim Brant, and other committee members should be commended for all their hard work in keeping Shandon financially sound. They have been good stewards of God's gifts.

The church receipts have grown only 1.6%, cumulatively, over the last three years. Because some of our expenses, such as utilities and maintenance, have increased significantly over the past three years, the Finance Committee has restrained other budget items in order to balance our budget. The Program Services (Music and Arts, Traditional Worship, LifeLine, Education, Church Council Operations, Communications, Missions, Evangelism, Older Adults, Stewardship, Stephen Ministry, and Health and Welfare) started each of the past three years with a 65% restriction of their respective proposed budgets. This year, 2011, is no different. By restricting the Programs Services, the Finance Committee is determined to keep our church finances in good order. It is also worth noting that Shandon has always paid 100% of its Conference Apportionments.

Through the end of May 2011, our receipts totaled \$805,486 (up 5.1% over same period for 2010). The church expenses were \$865,299 (down 0.5% versus last year) for a current deficit of \$59,813. This deficit represents the second smallest deficit in comparison to similar time periods during the last five calendar years.

Each one of us has been blessed by God with talents and gifts, and Shandon is fortunate to be the recipient of those many gifts and talents. When sharing your gifts with God and Shandon, please be mindful that our operating expenses are incurred on a monthly basis. I encourage each of you to remain faithful and consistent givers throughout the summer in order to reduce Shandon's deficit. The Graf family strives to give 60% of our pledge before June 30th of each year, and I encourage others to give more regularly, as well. 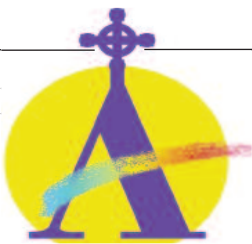

What Kind of Lawn Mower Are You Using – Gas or Electric?

- 17 million gallons of gasoline are spilled each year while refueling lawn equipment – that's more than the Exxon Valdes Spill.

And yes, a similar story can be told about gasoline powered leaf blowers and trimmers.

An alternative is an electric lawn mower, leaf blower or lawn trimmer. Electric powered lawn equipment is clean, quiet, economical, and easy to maintain. The average homeowner spends only \$3 to \$5 per year for electricity costs for a lawn mower. Look for the many Spring/Summer promotions.
